




Carnegie libraries in the USA



Map of Carnegie libraries location in the USA



4) Help homeowners reduce their carbon footprints by supporting additional choice

Technologies that are readily available and being used today can significantly reduce energy demands and greenhouse gas pollution. Homeowners will be given the tools and

resources to help make the right choice for them.

4.1 Boost low-carbon technology in homes Ontario intends to help homeowners purchase and install low-carbon energy technologies such as geothermal heat pumps and air-source heat pumps, solar thermal and solar energy generation systems that reduce reliance on fossil fuels for space and water heating. This will include an increased benefit for low-income households and vulnerable communities.

Heat Pumps warm and cool buildings by using outside heat from the air. ground or water.

- 4.2 Help retire older wood stoves: A new program targeting northern and rural communities, including Indigenous communities, would encourage households to switch out older polluting wood stoves for new high-efficiency wood stoves.
- 4.3 Near Net Zero Carbon Home Incentive: Rebates will go to individuals who purchase or build their own near net zero carbon emission homes, with energy efficiency performance that sufficiently

Code. In addition to reducing the higher upfront costs for homebuyers, this program will encourage construction of high-efficiency homes that pollute less.

4.4 Keep Electricity Rates Affordable: Use cap and trade proceeds to offset the cost of greenhouse gas pollution reduction initiatives that are currently funded by residential and industrial consumers through their bills.

5) Set lower-carbon standards for new buildings

5.1 Update the Building Code: The government intends to update the Building Code with long-term energy efficiency targets for new will come into effect by 2030 at the latest, and consult on initial changes that will be effective by 2020. Ontario will consult on how to best achieve these targets through **Building Code improvements**





1. Library Building: Program and Space Elements

Downtown Oakville Cultural Hub Project - Library Refinement Report

A revitalized downtown library in the Town of Oakville is one that still provides for traditional services, but that has transformed into a community hub. As a building that is central to the community, the library is a place for the people first and not primarily a place to display and provide access to the material collection. The success of a building is dependent on the people that use the building and in such 'people make buildings'. The new downtown library should support this idea by providing library spaces that are specifically designed for the people. This translates into providing opportunities for people of all ages to enjoy a variety of activities and environments from passive settings like quiet reading, quiet study and research, to energetic activities like socializing, interacting, conversing and collaborating in different ways, and to support specific requirements like small business hubs, tutoring and literacy. A variety of different spaces are essential and should be included within a downtown library to ensure the library's future success and to accommodate the constantly changing needs and desires of the Oakville community.

1.1 Traditional Building Spaces

The following is a description of the traditional building spaces that have been upgraded to provide and support the service requirements for today's library:

Prominent Entrance and Customer Service Area

Approximate Area: 1,500sf

The library main entrance and the customer service area provides the

- Main entry and fover/market space.
- . Customer service point one combined circulation and information counter to promote the movement of staff throughout the building rather than confined to behind multiple library
- . Self Check-out (Bibliotheca check-out units are preferred the same units used by the Brampton Library Gore Meadows branch)
- . Customer return area interior book drop access off of the Foyer and from the exterior.



Branch Work Room

Approximate Area: 1,000sf to 1,500sf

The branch work room provides the following:

- Branch staff work area
- · Includes space for a 5 to 6 Bin Automated Sortation Device
- Branch staff offices
- 1 interior book drop connected to the main Entry Fover and/or Customer Service Area.
- 1 exterior book drop. The automated sortation device could connect to both the interior and exterior book drops to maximize service efficiency.


