We recognize that the six branches are stronger together, making library service more convenient and vital.

We will:

- build on the six branch system through creative programming
- explore additional service options including online events and outreach to areas without a library branch
- collaborate and promote the Library as a whole as well as individual branches
- keep physical spaces welcoming safe, tidy and accessible
- display, local art and other creative methods will keep branches interesting
- employ connected and committed staff
- recognize the important contribution of Friends groups and encourage collaboration between groups
- respond to the community: adapt to changes, tailor collections, and offer strategic open hours
- act as a hub and distribution point for community groups

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
COLLECTIONS

Everyone can go to university by going to the public library.

We will:

- Commit a sufficient purchasing budget to meet community needs
- Respond to community interests, needs and trends
- Develop an annual collection plan informed by circulation data and reader feedback, striving for a collection that is balanced, diverse, and current
- Promote and expand digital offerings
- Collaborate with partners to provide access to a wider range of offerings
- Enhance the collection through programs featuring authors, specialists and other authorities in subject areas, ensuring programs and collections support one another
- Support local authors and writing groups
- Include accessible formats
- Assess the need for a core collection.



CHILDREN AND YOUTH

You told us:

"Supporting children and youth is essential."

The public library is a welcoming place for children and youth, supporting education, socialization and growth.

We will:

- Ensure every branch has a welcoming, well-appointed children's section of an appropriate size to meet the needs of the community it serves
- Collaborate with schools, organizations and groups serving children and prioritize bringing these groups into the library when possible
- Be attentive to changes and trends in literacy instruction
- · Be responsive to parents and caregivers
- Use and promote the five early literacy practices (reading, talking, writing, playing and singing) identified by Every Child Ready to Read.
- Encourage training and professional development for staff serving children
- Provide opportunities for families to connect
- Promote literacy programs including 1000 Books (or more) before Kindergarten, The Impressive Reader Society, and TD Summer Reading
